Phase II Information – Surgical and Procedural Care Block

During their time on SPC students will have the following rotations

- 4-weeks of General Surgery (Blue/Gold/Green/Orange/Pediatric/Red/VAH)
- 2 weeks of Anesthesiology
- 2 weeks of Ophthalmology or Neurosurgery
- 2 2-week rotations on high-interest specialty (Urology, Orthopedics, Interventional Radiology, Transplant, Otolaryngology, Plastics, Vascular)

Continuity Clinic

Students are assigned a faculty preceptor based on their interests to work with weekly during their SPC block. Faculty preceptors are expected to provide feedback to students on skills and their Longitudinal Patient Project. *Continuity Clinic Preceptor Expectations* are included.

Case Discussions

Case Discussions are offered on Thursday afternoons for the SPC block from 1-5pm. Faculty can volunteer for sessions that align with their clinical interests/specialty. *Case Discussion Schedule* attached.

Orientation

Orientation is held on the first date of the SPC rotation. Faculty can volunteer to help with the suture skills. These skills sessions are from 8:3-11:30 am and 12:30-3:30pm. Sample *Orientation Schedule* attached.

OSCE

The OSCE is a multi-station objective structured clinical examination. This is given at the end of the SPC block on Thursdays from 7:45am-4:00pm. There are three volunteer opportunities for faculty:

- In-Room Assessment 7:45am-1:00pm or 11:45am-4:00pm.
- Back-Up In-Room Assessors can either check into the HSLC at 7:45am or 11:45am, or they can provide a cell phone number to be reached at if they are needed to assess due to a scheduled assessor being unavailable.
- Remote Assessors will be assigned to approximately 10-12 student videos with an approximate time for completion being 3-5 hours. Remote assessors are given one week to complete the assessments.
